★Good news!★We made it!★

★Farm mortgage paid off!★

Together we have raised the \$210,000 needed to pay off the mortgage that we took out to purchase the 62-acre farm on Bush Hill Road in Manchester and Glastonbury! We literally could NOT have done it without the generous financial support of our members — all of you! along with grants, Town of Manchester donations, corporate matching funds, and our tag sales. The final (balloon) payment was due on August 18, 2018, but with our fundraising efforts, we have actually accomplished this massive goal early, paying the final \$18,051.95 check to The Conservation Fund on February 3, 2018. Even though the interest amount was low (just 3.0% per year), it was still worthwhile to pay off early, saving about \$8,000.00 in interest. This was the biggest fundraising effort we have ever undertaken! We believe that this open space land will enhance the community, and offer habitat to wildlife, plants, and trees — land that otherwise might have become a development, never again to offer the natural landscape to this area of Connecticut. Thank you to every donor — hundreds of members and supporters, including 190 individuals, 2 garden clubs, a church, fraternal organizations, and conservationists who read about the mortgage in the newspaper and sent in a check!

Our volunteers are at work nearly every day at the farm: mowing, moving debris (farmers are known for leaving old vehicles, etc., out "on the back 40"), removing invasive plants, and creating a parking lot, farm road, and trails around the property! Combined with the abutting 13-acre Manning-Ferris property, donated in 1993, our volunteers have a 75-acre section of Manchester / Glastonbury to maintain!



Dear Land Trust Members and Friends:

Major goal reached

A hearty THANK YOU to the donors who paid off the mortgage on the 62-acre farm at Bush Hill Road. This unprecedented groundswell of generosity shows a serious commitment to protecting the environment and to providing habitat for flora and fauna. The \$210,000.00 mortgage, from The Conservation Fund, allowed us to purchase the farm in August 2015 — it bridged the gap between the State of Connecticut matching grant and all our Trust's resources. Interest would have been upwards of \$19,000.00 if we hadn't paid off the loan earlier. We saved about \$8,000 in interest.

In addition to all the individual donations, the generous payments from the Town of Manchester, and the grants, I want to thank former Board member Jon Mercier for his work to obtain the mortgage, and also his serious financial commitment to the project. Dick Borden, Jack Bowden, Susan Barlow, and former Board member Bob Melusky worked on the fundraising campaign. Every Board member donated to the cause.

Now that the farm trails have been established, parking area built, and drainage problems resolved, the farm has become a popular location for runners, hikers, dogwalkers, and bird-watchers. If you have not seen the improvements to the farm property, please plan to come and view the terrific work of our volunteers, particularly Brad Palmer, Colin McNamara, Doug MacGillvary, Gerry Botti, John Hovey, and Roger Chadwick. For financial support for the trails, signage, and a pavilion, we thank the Manchester Road Race Committee, Cruisin' on Main, SBM Charitable Foundation, and Fuss & O'Neill.

The farm is only one of our popular locations — many visitors and hikers roam the open spaces at Risley Park, Salter's Pond, Stickney Hill, Highland Park, and the Cheney rail trail. Come out for one of our guided hikes, or explore on your own. We have 457 acres open to the public.



The Trust has been an IRS-recognized charitable entity since 1972, the year we were founded. Surveys of charitable donors indicate that "tax avoidance" is a minor reason for gifts. Most donors have a heart-felt desire to make a long-lasting difference in the world. The Land Trust believes that every effort we make, no matter how modest, will benefit the world in perpetuity — preserving open spaces with the result that our communities breathe better air, have purer water, and have the opportunity to enjoy the outdoors. A key aspect of the Trust's work is that it has been done since 1972 entirely by volunteers. Financial gifts support our administrative costs: rent for our office, insurance, equipment for managing the preserves, and memberships in state and national land trust organizations.


