Dear Land Trust Members and Friends:

Land acquisitions — The Land has recently added these Manchester properties: • 1.64 acres on Round Hill Rd., a gift of Merritt (Mike) Baldwin • 1.4 acres on Lindman St., a gift of Jose Linares • 6.8 acres on Greenwood Dr., purchased, and • 21 acres on Bush Hill Rd., purchased with a grant from the Audubon Foundation, thanks to work by Dermot Jones and Malcolm Barlow. This brings our acreage to 489.26. That is a lot to be proud of, and we thank our members for their support. For more information, see our website: manchesterlandtrust.org/properties.html.

Lombardo farm — The Land Trust has been trying to buy the 102-acre Lombardo Farm property in the southwest section of Manchester, contiguous to our 62-acre farm on Bush Hill Rd. The good news is that we succeeded in our grant request to the State of Connecticut DEEP. The challenging news, given the \$1,700,000 price, is that the grant would be for \$300,000. While our Land Trust Board and the Town of Manchester have been enthusiastic about protecting this property as open space, fundraising could prove difficult at this time. Our purchase agreement expires December 31, 2020. We'll keep you informed via our e-newsletter, website, Facebook page, and press releases.

Why we do what we do — Here is an unsolicited compliment from a neighbor of our Stickney Hill property in Rockville: "Hello, I live on Pleasant St. near the walking trail! The tag sale — The tag sales began in 2016, a major fundraiser that brought in much-needed cash. We will miss Lenny Parla (1933-2020), who worked devotedly with his wife, Terry, to organize, manage, and clean up the tag sales. Due to the pandemic, we're not sure when the cider barn will open again for treasure-shopping, browsing, and socializing. Thank you to all who donated and bought items.

Supporting the Land Trust forever: Wills, trusts, life insurance, IRAs, 401ks, annuities, charitable gift annuities, and land — there are many ways you can make gifts to the Land Trust, including using estate plans and Required Minimum Distributions RMDs (at age 70-1/2) from an IRA. Gifts should be designated to: Manchester Land Conservation Trust, Inc., federal EIN 23-7212665. The Trust is an IRS-recognized charitable entity. A key aspect of the Trust's work is that it has been done since 1972 entirely by volunteers. Financial gifts support our administrative costs: rent for our office, insurance, equipment for property management, and memberships in state and national land trust organizations. The trust also has a permanent endowment fund to help meet future needs. In addition to financial gifts, donations of land can be testaments to the donors in perpetuity.














Membership increase
